The crown is just the tip of the iceberg. Approximately 42% of dental pathology is found subgingivally. Radiographs will help diagnose pathology that is not visible from the surface, confirm suspect pathology as well as help demonstrate the pathology to the client. Dental radiographs can improve the standard of care in your practice and increase your clinic's revenue. Session: Block That Pain! Pain Management and Anesthesia for the Dental Patient Pain management is more than the latest popular terminology. It is an important part of veterinary dentistry. Many of the procedures performed on animals are painful and it is our duty as technicians to ensure that our patients are as comfortable as possible. The delivery of local nerve blocks prior to performing many dental procedures or oral surgery is a great way to create preemptive analgesia. Her job

Her job responsibilities range from medication administration, catheter placement and fluid therapy, and jogging lameness cases to obtaining advanced imaging such as radiographs, CT, and MRI. Shana is primarily responsible for preparing surgery patients and assisting in surgeries.

In 2015, Shana obtained a Veterinary Technician Specialty in Equine Veterinary Nursing. Her advanced knowledge and

skills are utilized every day and have benefited every aspect of her career in equine medicine. She now serves on the board of the Academy of Equine Veterinary Nursing Technicians and mentors new specialty applicants. Her greatest interests outside of large animal surgery are emergency medicine and hippotherapy. Shana has also coedited a few textbooks for Elsevier: *Mosby's Comprehensive Review for Veterinary Technicians*, 5th and 6th edition and *Large Animal Medicine for Veterinary Technicians*, 2nd edition. In addition she created and currently instructs two interactive courses, and created a non-interactive course, RACE approved, available on VetMedTeam.
